A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR DANIEL J. URSU

The City of Richmond Heights was recently successful in obtaining a grant to purchase a modestly sized bus to be used exclusively for Richmond Heights seniors who are at least 60 years old or for Richmond Heights disabled adults! Many of you saw the bus on display at the Family Day Parade and weekend. This new program will be run in coordination with the Senior Transportation Connection of Cuyahoga County, which eventually hopes to link all of the County communities, although our program will begin transporting to points primarily in Richmond Heights. It will be administered through the Recreation Department. If interested, please call (216) 383-6313 for costs and further details. **To use this service you must be registered in advance.** The bus is wheelchair capable. The program will begin this fall.

We often take for granted the excellent service that we receive daily from our Fire and Police Departments. These men and women assist us around the clock to help in time of need, be it our Fire Department Paramedics stabilizing and transporting a loved one to the hospital due to a cardiac malfunction, or, for instance, our Police officers helping you to maneuver your vehicle through flash-flooded roadways from the heavy rains that our region experienced the past couple of months. Members of our Fire and Police forces are selected through a rigorous and lengthy program administered by our Civil Service Commission-consisting of Jim Redmond, Chairman; Jeff Pohlhammer; and Rick Henfling-that includes testing for professional knowledge, physical skill and mental stability. It is not unusual for Richmond Heights to have dozens of applicants for a single opening; the successful candidate at the end of this process is truly highly qualified to serve you...and these men and women are always there to protect and nurture residents for the betterment of our health, safety and welfare!

Lastly, our community is made up of persons of varied race, cultures and heritages. Many of you have participated in the various community events over the past few years with the goal of making this diversity an asset to Richmond Heights, such as the "Book Review Night" when residents gathered to review the book "The Color of Water" or one of the Heights Community Congress workshops. Also, many of you are aware that I established a Cultural Commission a couple of years ago. The Commission is in the process of organizing neighborhood coffees to help persons living on the same street to deliberately meet one another - our busy suburban lifestyles are often not otherwise conducive for our doing so! 





FOR BILLING PURPOSES, PLEASE NOTE:

- If you have Medicare Part B as your primary insurance, you must bring your Medicare card with you.
- Anyone who belongs to a Medicare HMO or a Senior HMO cannot bill Medicare for the flu vaccine through our program. These residents should go to their HMO to receive the flu vaccine or pay upfront.
- If you choose to pay for your vaccine, the fee is \$25 (cash or check only).

POLICE DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL NEWS

ATTENTION SENIOR CITIZENS NEW EXPANDED HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION ON PROPERTY TAX

Beginning July 2, 2007 the Homestead Exemption is now available to all Ohio homeowners, regardless of income, who are either age 65 or older or if you are permanently and totally disabled. All households who qualify for the Homestead Exemption will now receive a flat \$25,000.00 property tax exemption on the market value of your home. The exact amount of savings will vary from location to location, but overall, across Ohio, qualified homeowners should save an average of about \$400 per year. The new Homestead Exemption starts with tax bills payable in 2008. Additional information and applications are available at City Hall or at the Ohio Department of Taxation website at www.tax.ohio.gov. Applications must be received by the county auditor's office no later than October 1, 2007.

EUCLID CREEK WATERSHED CUYAHOGA SOIL & WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Water conservation on your property can provide many benefits to our local streams and rivers. Watersheds like Euclid Creek, which were once forests and farms are now covered with parking lots, homes and businesses. Our streams and rivers need room to hold water or re-enter the earth during rainy events. Reducing the amount of water entering our creeks and rivers can help prevent streambank erosion. Here are some outdoor water conservation tips to use this Summer to keep our streams and rivers healthy.

- Sweep rather than hose off sidewalks, patios, decks and driveways.
- When washing cars, use a trigger nozzle that automatically turns off.
- Use water-efficient plants with deep root systems in your garden.
- Use mulch around plantings to hold in moisture.
- Use a timing system on your sprinkler system or consider using drip system for trees and shrubs for an efficient irrigation system.
- Increase landscaped areas which can hold more water than lawn areas.
- Limit paved areas and use porous or paver systems to reduce water runoff to streams.

AT YOUR SERVICE DEPARTMENT NEWS AND NOTES

Leaf Season... Just a quick reminder; the Service Department will start picking up leaves the last week in October, any changes will be posted on City Hall's message board. Please do not put sticks, rocks or any other materials in with your leaves our men could be injured and equipment could be damaged.

Snow Season... It is a little early to be talking about snow but this City Edition covers the month's thru-January, and we had a rough season last year. The following will help us all get thru the winter months...

-Residents should be prepared for poor weather conditions at all times. If poor road conditions are forecast you need to make arrangements to leave earlier.

-If you encounter poor road conditions it would be wise to reduce your vehicles speed and allow ample stopping distance between you and another vehicle. This is also important when traveling behind a City plow truck. These trucks throw blinding snow off their plows and could make sudden stops, and often back into intersections after dumping snow to plow the return lane of a road.

-If we encounter continuous heavy snowfall, residents should not have "unrealistic expectations" of the Service Department.

-The City is **NOT responsible** for the removal of snow thrown into any driveway by City snow plows. Residents or snowplowing contractors should avoid plowing, shoveling, or blowing any snow onto the road surface. Piles of snow in the road can create dangerous obstacles for motorists and the City snowplowing equipment. If a person is reported leaving snow in the roadway, he or she could be subject to a possible citation. Residents should stress to their children to stay out of the path of snow being thrown off the plows there could be rocks or ice which could injure a child in its path. Children should not dig tunnels in the snow or build igloos near the roadway or roadside ditches.

-**Rural Mailboxes** – Mailboxes should be kept in good condition so they can withstand being hit by the force of the snow being thrown off the plow trucks. If a mailbox is damaged or the post broken because of thrown snow the City **will not** repair or replace it.

The City will only repair or replace a mailbox that has been hit directly by the snowplow equipment. If the City does have to replace a mailbox post it will be done with a post that is no larger than a 4"x 4". All mailboxes & posts that we do have to replace because of a direct hit from our plows will be replaced with a conventional box and wood post only.
