A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR DANIEL J. URSU

I am excited to let you know of the new Richmond Heights Community Mediation Service (RHCMS) which has now been established through our Cultural Commission. As you might have been aware through the media, Police Chief Gene Rowe, Commission Chair Colonel Carl Carter and I have been working on this for some time to provide a forum to resolve differences among neighbors at an early stage, thereby reducing animosity and stress.

The mediators are highly dedicated and motivated Richmond Heights resident volunteers who have undergone an extensive twenty hours of professional Mediation Certification Training to help provide this program to our community. The program can be accessed by calling (216) 486-3777. Both interested parties must agree to utilize mediation.

The mediation process allows neighbors to resolve disputes privately with the help of a Mediation Team before they turn into larger issues requiring the potentially expensive and more time consuming court system. This less-stressful dispute-solving tool results in a fair settlement to the satisfaction of the parties.

Examples that might benefit from the mediation process include property damage, condition of neighbor's yard, trespassing, garbage/trees/fences, animals, noise and unsupervised youths. Mediation represents a free and convenient alternative to an escalating conflict by early resolution instead of calling the police, going to court or endlessly arguing with each other. You will be contacted within three business days of calling the above phone number.

SUMMER SPRINKLING PROGRAM

This program is designed for residential customers and is open to Richmond Heights homeowners (**you must own and occupy the home**) who are customers of the **City of Euclid Wastewater Treatment Plant**. Under this program, summer residential sewer bills are based on average winter consumption. If you used more water during the summer billing period (May 1st thru September 30th) than you used during the previous winter billing period (October 1st thru April 30th), you should see a reduction in your sewer bill. There is a one time fee of \$10 due with the application form. The application form must be returned by January 1, 2010.

Complete information and application forms will be available at City Hall beginning September 28, 2009.

If you are a customer of the **Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD)** you may also be entitled to a reduced sewer bill. There is no fee for the application or to participate in the program. For additional information, contact the District's Customer Service Department at (216) 881-8247.

The Department's police dog, "KUBO" won the honor of "Top Dog" at the Ohio Law Enforcement K9 Association's "Top Dog" competition on July 12, 2009. Several Law Enforcement K-9 teams in northeast Ohio participated in this event, which was a test of how well the dogs and their handlers performed in three areas: the search of narcotics, apprehension of resisting suspects, and obedience. The Richmond Heights Police K-9 team, handler Ptl. Tim Casto and "Kubo" won two of the three events and took home the honors and the trophy for the "Top Dog" in the competition. Ptl. Casto and Kubo have been with the Department since 2004 and have been a valuable addition to the agency's capability and service to the community.

Residents 65 years of age and older and adults who have a chronic illness, such as asthma, cancer, diabetes, heart disease, HIV/AIDS or kidney disease are eligible.

- If you have Medicare Part B as your primary insurance, you must bring your Medicare card with you.

To All City Residents... Please Take The Time To Read The Information Below; It Will Help Us All Get Through Our Very Busy Fall & Winter Seasons

Leaf Season... Just a quick reminder, the Service Department starts to pick up leaves the last week of October; any changes will be posted on City Hall's message board and on the City website under Information Board. Please **do not** put sticks, rocks, or any other materials in with your leaves; our men could be injured and equipment could be damaged.

Winter News/Snow Season... We realize it is a little early to be talking about snow but this City Edition covers the months from October thru January, and we had a **VERY** inclement weather season last year. The following will help us get thru the winter months...

- * Residents should be prepared for poor weather conditions at all times. If poor road conditions are forecast, you need to make arrangements to leave earlier.
- * If you encounter poor road conditions, it would be wise to reduce your vehicle's speed and allow ample stopping distance between you and another vehicle. This is also important when traveling behind a City plow truck. These trucks throw blinding snow off their plows and could make sudden stops, often back into intersections after dumping snow to plow the return lane of a road.

- * During heavy snowfall conditions it takes a longer time to remove the accumulations from the roadways and therefore, patience is required by our residents while our Service Department makes every effort to remove the snow.

- * The City is **Not Responsible** for the removal of snow thrown into any driveway by City snowplows. Residents or snowplowing contractors should avoid plowing, shoveling, or blowing any snow onto the road surface. Piles of snow in the road can create dangerous obstacles for motorists and the City snowplowing equipment. If a person is reported leaving snow in the roadway, he or she could be subject to a possible citation. Residents should stress to their children to stay out of the path of snow being thrown off the plows; there could be rocks or ice which could injure a child in its path. **Children should not dig tunnels in the snow or build igloos near the roadway or roadside ditches.**

Sensible Salting Practices for this Winter Season

Please note all surrounding cities are expected to follow similar guidelines

1. There will be no salting between the hours of 11:00 pm. & 4:00 am. EXCEPT for Hills, and MAIN Intersections

During these hours it is not feasible to salt main roads. Due to low traffic volumes, the salt is not effective and in some instances can create even worse conditions. The goal of the Service Department will be to provide a "passable roadway" which is defined as "a roadway surface that is free from drifts, snow ridges, and as much ice and snow pack as is practical and can be traveled safely at reasonable speeds."

2. Salting during snow events. During periods of snowfall of 1" or more per hour, main roads will be plowed as frequently as possible but will only be salted at intersections, hills, curves, bridges, and school zones. "Spot salting" defined as "intermittent spreading of salt at 150' intervals", will also be utilized when practicable.

3. Limited salting on secondary roads.

Secondary roads will be plowed as often as possible, but will not be salted except for 200' at each intersection, and at hills, curves, bridges, & school zones. Spot salting will be utilized on secondary roads when practicable.

Rural Mailboxes... Mailboxes should be kept in good condition so they can withstand being hit by the snow thrown off the plow trucks. If a mailbox is damaged or the post broken because of thrown snow the City **will not** repair or replace it. **The City will only repair or replace a mailbox that has been hit directly by the snowplow equipment.** If the City does have to replace a mailbox & post it will be done with a post that is no larger than 4"x4". All mailboxes & posts that the Service Department has to replace because of a **direct hit from a plow** will be replaced **with a conventional box and & wood post only.**

CITY CHARTER AMENDMENTS ON NOVEMBER 3 BALLOT

Pursuant to City Charter requirement, Mayor Ursu appointed a Charter Review Committee of nine City residents to review the City's Charter and to recommend amendments thereto, if any. After 6 months of review and deliberation, the Committee submitted its proposed amendments to the City Council on July 24. Although there were several minor wording changes to the Charter recommended by the Committee, the more substantive proposed amendments that will appear on the November 3 election ballot are:

1. As the need may arise, City Council meetings would be permitted to be held elsewhere in the City other than at the Council Chambers.
2. Clarifies that City Council may hold executive sessions during Council committee meetings for any reason provided by state law.
3. Clarifies that the Clerk of Council need not be an existing “officer” of the municipality as a prerequisite to being eligible for election to the position of Clerk by the Council.
4. Clarifies that certain legislative matters, whether passed by ordinance or resolution, shall not go into effect earlier than thirty (30) days after the final passage by Council.
5. Provides reference to the City Code in general when referring to the duties of the Commissioner of Building, Zoning, and Housing.
6. Retains only one deadline for Council to adopt the annual appropriation ordinance which must occur within 90 days from the beginning of the fiscal year.
7. Increases the threshold for requiring competitive bidding of City contracts from the current threshold of more than \$15,000 per contract to match the state law of more than \$25,000 per contract.
8. Clarifies the exception to competitive bidding for professional services.
9. Sets forth an exception to competitive bidding for the City's participation in cooperative purchasing programs of the State of Ohio and its political subdivisions where bids or quotes are received by those cooperative purchasing programs.
10. Permits the Chiefs of Police and Fire to reside within Cuyahoga County or any county adjacent to Cuyahoga County rather than the 15-mile radius from City Hall set forth in the current Charter provision. (An amendment is necessary so as not to violate the Ohio Supreme Court's recent decision with respect to residency of city employees.)
11. Requires that no member of the Recreation Board shall hold any other public office or position in the municipality.
12. Specifies that the Planning Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, and Recreation Board of the City are not required to meet monthly if they do not have an application or other matters before them to consider.
13. Specifies that the Planning Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, and Recreation Board of the City may have executive sessions as provided by the laws of the State of Ohio.

Please consider these proposed amendments and vote on November 3.

EXPANDED HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION ON PROPERTY TAX

The Homestead Exemption allows **senior citizens and permanently and totally disabled Ohioans** to reduce their property tax burden by shielding some of the market value of their home from taxation. The exemption, which takes the form of a credit on property tax bills, allows qualifying homeowners to exempt \$25,000 of the market value of their home from all local property taxes. For example, through the Homestead Exemption, a home with a market value of \$100,000 would be billed as if it is worth \$75,000. The exact amount of savings will vary from location to location, but overall qualified homeowners should save an average of about \$400 per year. To qualify you must:

- Be an Ohio resident
- You must own and occupy your home
- Be at least 65 years of age **OR** totally permanently disabled

For 2010, the Cuyahoga County Auditor's Office will be accepting applications from January 4 through June 7, 2010. Applications should be available at City Hall beginning in December or at the Ohio Department of Taxation website at www.tax.ohio.gov. If you have any questions, you may contact the Cuyahoga County Auditor's Office-Homestead Exemption Department at (216) 443-7050.

If your application is approved, the Cuyahoga County Auditor's Office will notify you by enclosing a notice showing the calculation of your tax reduction with the first tax bill you receive. If the county denies your application, you will receive a notice explaining the reason for denial.

Once you begin receiving the Homestead Exemption credit, you **do not** have to re-apply each year. However, if your circumstances change (no longer own the home; no longer occupy it as your primary place of residence, or if your disability status has changed), you must notify the Cuyahoga County Auditor's Office.

Administrative Changes



TRANSPORTATION NEWS

Due to financial constraints, the Board of Education reduced the District's transportation services to the minimums as prescribed by State Law. Only students in grades K-8 who live beyond two miles from their schools will be provided transportation as well as all students with special needs in grades Pre-K through 12. Therefore, some changes have been made to the method of delivering students to school. The map below shows the route buses, parents and students must take to enter and exit school grounds during the hours of 7:00 a.m. - 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. - 4 p.m. on school days. Although school has already started and these traffic patterns have already begun, the general public should be aware of the changes and how it might affect travel in the vicinity of the schools.



GENERAL OPERATING LEVY ON NOVEMBER 3 BALLOT

The Richmond Heights Board of Education has placed a 4 mill, general operating levy on the November 3 ballot. The 4 mill levy was considered following a general survey of Richmond Heights residents conducted by the Board earlier this year. The levy will generate \$1,036,320.60 per year for our students. The levy would cost a homeowner of a \$100,000 home, \$122.50 per year (just 34 cents a day), after Homestead and Rollback Exemption. Remember our kids on November 3.
