A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR DAVID H. ROCHE

Happy fall! After over seven years, my final day serving as your Mayor of Richmond Heights will be December 31, 2021. It has been an honor and privilege to serve our amazing, vibrant community as your elected official for over 18 years.

The City has planned a season packed with special events and projects providing a safe and healthy environment for family fun. We kicked off summer with three successful, well attended Wednesday night gazebo concerts in the park and National Night Out, normally the first Tuesday of August, which was combined with Unity in the Community Day at the Richmond Heights new Upper School on August 12. We appreciate all the amazing volunteers and sponsors who contributed to our residents enjoying both community events.

The City has so many reasons to be excited for its future. Planning continues for a dramatic new neighborhood to be constructed on the obsolete 69-acre Richmond Town Square mall site located at the corner of Richmond Road and Wilson Mills Road. Flexjet, the city's second largest employer, began construction of its \$20 million Global Operations Center at the Cuyahoga County Airport. They are a leading luxury private jet company offering private aviation services including fractional jet ownership, leasing, and jet cards. Flexjet anticipates the Operations Center to bring an additional 200 employees to their campus at the County Airport.

Located within the Richmond Heights Community Park is the Kiwanis Lodge. The Lodge has been undergoing an extensive, multi-year \$500,000 renovation with complete ADA accessibility, new lower-level kitchenette, bathrooms, and showers (which allow the Lodge to serve as a Community Emergency Shelter if needed); and a first-floor renovation to include new bathrooms, lighting, large windows, and an outdoor patio and deck event space overlooking the Cuyahoga County Airport. The Lodge, with its two large banquet halls, kitchen, and adjacent parking, are available for residents to rent for their next family gathering.

Our Community Park features a new \$161,000 ADA accessible playground (funded in part with a \$120,700 Ohio Department of Natural Resources grant), picnic tables and pavilion, multiple grills, ballfields suitable for softball or baseball, and tennis courts. We will be building a similar new accessible playground this year through a Cuyahoga County grant awarded to the City at DeSan Park on the City's west side. Greenwood Farm, another 20-acre City owned park located on Richmond Road, sits along the edge of Euclid Creek and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Besides the beautiful farmhouse dating from 1917, there are walking and hiking trails, access to Euclid Creek, gardens, picnic area, and many other nature loving surprises to be explored.

The Fall Fun Fest is scheduled for Saturday, September 18, at Greenwood Farm. The Recreation Department has coordinated a Community Shred Day, Amish Bus Tour, and Breakfast with Santa for the remainder of this year. For residents ages 50 years or older, the City collaborates with Hillcrest Meals on Wheels, the Senior Transportation Connection, and the Community Partnership on Aging.

We also encourage residents to sign up for volunteer opportunities at our various upcoming events, programs and activities that take place year-round. Our volunteers and sponsors are the heart of the City and without them, the success of our recreation activities wouldn't be possible.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Pre-development activity continues for the Belle Oaks Marketplace residential and retail mixed-use project proposed for the Richmond Town Square mall site. Developer DealPoint Merrill recently completed acquisition of Richmond Town Square mall. With acquisition of the mall, DealPoint Merrill now controls the entire 69-acre development site. DealPoint had previously acquired the former Macy's Department store (converted into the Life Storage indoor storage facility) and the former Sears Department store. At this time, the only remaining Richmond Town Square mall tenants include Regal Cinemas, Planet Fitness, Life Storage, Conrad's, and Firestone as these businesses have exterior access. In addition to the mall, DealPoint Merrill acquired the adjacent vacant La Fiesta restaurant property, adding that property to the overall development site. DealPoint has also acquired the stormwater retention basin west of Richmond Road that will be part of the stormwater management plan for the Belle Oaks Marketplace development. The city and developer continue negotiating public and private aspects of financing the \$260 million project, as well as the Development Agreement that will guide the development of the project.

In April we were notified that the City was awarded two grants from Cuyahoga County for continued improvements in Richmond Heights. The first grant, a \$150,000 Community Development Block Grant, will fund renovations to walkways in the Community Park, including an American with Disabilities Act (ADA) walkway from the parking lot to the front entrance of the Kiwanis Lodge Community Center. This grant will also fund renovations to the pathway on the east side of Richmond Road along the Cuyahoga County Airport property. The second grant, a \$50,000 Community Development Supplemental Grant, will fund a new ADA accessible playground at DeSan Park to replace the obsolete playground now at DeSan. Both projects are anticipated to be completed this year.

In August the Cuyahoga County Public Library opened its new \$1.5 million Richmond Heights Branch as part of the new Richmond Heights Upper School. It has its own separate entrance, dedicated parking, and will be open seven days a week serving both students and the general public. The new library branch, at 5,191 square feet, is approximately 50 percent larger than the former branch that had been located at 5235 Wilson Mills Road. The new Richmond Heights Branch is the first branch in the Cuyahoga County Public Library system to be designed and located as part of a school building.

Foundation work is underway for the new \$20 million Flexjet Global Operations Center at Cuyahoga County Airport in Richmond Heights. The Global Operations Center will be the nerve center for tracking and monitoring all Flexjet operated corporate aircraft worldwide 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

DIVISION OF FIRE AWARDED \$39,104 FITNESS & WELLNESS GRANT

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has awarded the Division of Fire a \$39,104 Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG). The grant funding will provide training and equipment to develop a fitness and injury prevention program in the Division of Fire. The grant monies are allocated for the tuition cost for three members to attend a Peer Fitness Training Program (and become certified); backfill staffing expenses; and the purchase of exercise equipment. The grant has a total value of \$37,241.90 (95%) with a local cost share of \$1,862.10 (5%). The training will be conducted during the 4th quarter of FY2021 and the equipment will be purchased in the 1st quarter of FY2022.



POLICE DEPARTMENT SURVEY RESULTS

On May 16, 2021 until July 1, 2021, the Police Department conducted a service survey for our community. We asked the following:

1. Based on your experience, interactions and/or observations of the Richmond Heights Police Department, please rate the department overall. Options were Excellent, Good, Average, Poor, Unsure
2. How do you rate the professionalism of the Richmond Heights police officers you have met or encountered overall? Options were Excellent, Good, Average, Poor, Unsure
3. The Richmond Heights Division of Police provides some of the following valuable free services: On-line reporting for minor crimes, Community Block watch (Crime Prevention and Beautification Initiative), Cop Scouts for kids 9-12 years old, Home and business security analysis surveys, House watches for when you're on vacation, Senior Citizen Police Academy, and Safety presentations. What other services would you like to see the department provide?

General comments

We had 74 surveys returned (30 mail in/drop-off surveys and 44 on-line responses). This is an increase of responses compared to our first survey last year.

When asked to rate the department overall, 78% rated us as excellent with 16.4% as good. Combining those numbers, 94.4% found our department either excellent or good. When asked to rate the professionalism of the officers they have met or encountered, 79.4% rated them as excellent with 15% as good. Combining those numbers, 94.4% found them to be excellent or good. The responses to the survey also helped us learn about matters important to our community.

Although the sampling was small, it did provide a snapshot perspective from our community regarding how they felt about us. It was clear that those we serve are pleased with what we do and how we serve them. **We clearly are closer to being a national model of excellence, the Gold Standard of American Policing.**

SERVICE DEPARTMENT NEWS AND NOTES

With fall being right around the corner, leaf season won't be far behind...Your cooperation is required in following a few guidelines in order to ensure the **safety of both personnel and equipment**.

- * Please rake leaves to the tree lawn. **PLEASE DO NOT PLACE LEAVES IN THE STREET AND PLEASE DO NOT PLACE LEAVES NEAR A FIRE HYDRANT.**
- * Branches, twigs, sticks, rocks and grass clippings **MUST NOT** be mixed in with the leaves. This will cause damage and clogging to the leaf machines.
- * The decision not to pick up leaf piles contaminated with any of the above items will be at the discretion of the Public Works Director. **Please let your landscaper know about these guidelines.**
- * If you prefer, you may bag your leaves for collection by our rubbish contractor, you could put out up to 10 bags.

This is a great time to check and repair your rural mailboxes, make sure they will withstand the snow and ice that comes off our snow plows in the winter. Check your post to make sure it isn't rotting and make sure your mailbox is secure on your post. We will **NOT** repair or replace a mailbox that is damaged due to snow or ice that comes off of our snow plows, we only repair or replace the mailbox if we directly hit the mailbox with our plow.

RICHMOND HEIGHTS KIWANIS CLUB

The Richmond Heights Kiwanis Club is a place where you can help sustain the local community with a special focus on supporting youths. They are the longest, continuously running service organization in Richmond Heights. They are youth focused with the whole organization designed to support children. A \$2,000 donation was made to Richmond Heights Schools to be used utilized directly for the students at the new campus. They sponsored a Harvest for Hunger campaign. Richmond Heights Kiwanis Club received a \$1,000 KARES Grant from Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation which provided two hand sanitizing stations which were installed at the new Richmond Heights Community Park Playground. The 45th Annual Golf Outing in honor of past chairman, Jim Giarelli, was held on August 22 to support the scholarship fund and other charitable programs for children.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK: "LEARN THE SOUNDS OF FIRE SAFETY™"

The Richmond Heights Division of Fire is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®)—the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years—to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "**Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety™.**" This year's campaign will be held from **October 3 - October 9**, working to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

The Richmond Heights Division of Fire encourages all residents to embrace the 2021 Fire Prevention Week theme. What do the sounds mean? Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family.

It's important to learn the different sounds of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. When an alarm makes noise—a beeping sound or a chirping sound—you must take action. Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the alarms and knows how to respond. To learn the sounds of your specific smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, check the manufacturer's instructions that came in the box, or search the brand and model online.

The Richmond Heights Division of Fire wants to share safety tips to help you "**Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety™.**"

- * A continuous set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- * A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- * All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- * Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.
- * Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

KIM THOMAS NAMED PRESIDENT OF GREENWOOD FARM

Kim Thomas has served on the Greenwood Farm Board for a little more than a year, initially filling the unexpired term of Council President Eloise Henry when Henry stepped down from the board. Mayor David Roche recently reappointed Thomas to the board for a full two-year term.

Speaking about Greenwood Farm, which is located at 264 Richmond Road, its new president said, "I want the community to bring their family out, enjoy it, and know that Greenwood Farm is a community park and accessible to the community for events. My goal is to help design programs at the farm to attract businesses like we are currently doing through our new (Greenwood Farm) website."



The Greenwood Farm barn, built in the 1880s, is thought to be the city's oldest structure, while the farm's history dates to 1798, facts that have earned the farm a place on the National Register of Historic Places. City leaders have spoken in recent times of making it better known that Greenwood Farm is a public park. Thomas said she will look at several possibilities in making the park more familiar to residents and in putting it to more uses.

"It's really not about what I want for the park," she said, "it's about what the residents want. We want to make the community aware that this is a park. This is their park. It can be whatever they want it to be. We want them to come out and enjoy it."

"It's a beautiful park," she said. "We could have wedding receptions there and families coming and doing a hike. We could have different companies come in for events. I'm in conversation with Blue Cross/Blue Shield. They want to do a 'lunch and learn' outside in the park for seniors and talk about health care and what seniors need to help navigate them through. Right now, it's still new to me, but once I put my thinking cap on and have some conversations with the community, we'll know more about what we can do."

Thomas said she has been in contact with a representative of University Hospitals about the possibility of installing a community garden at Greenwood Farm. "A community garden would really help the community get involved and allow them to have plots," Thomas said. "University is willing to help sponsor it and the goal is to reach out to other business owners that could provide for things for gardens. UH has offered to assist us in any way possible. UH is even willing to volunteer (with garden upkeep) because some of their employees have to do community service." Thomas said that the community gardens would likely be installed next year.

"We have received grants from the Ohio EPA's 319 surface water program, which has led to a \$187,000 grant towards stormwater management and conservation practices at Greenwood Farm," Thomas said, when speaking of present and future funding. "I would like us to pursue grants with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources in support of conservation and environmental activities."

She added that Greenwood Farm could also be poised to receive governmental support through the US Department of Agriculture's Natural Resource and Conservation Service, which provides grants for forestry management and other environmental and conservation practices.

Current members of the Greenwood Farm Board include Christine Dolinar, Kathryn Gamber, Aire Roche, Mayor David Roche, Rhonda Gibson, Tony Miceli, Ronald Peura and Richard Schmidt.
