Since taking office in January, my administration and I have been busy working for our residents and businesses. I am happy to report that Richmond Heights is stronger and safer, and we are working hard to create an excellent quality of life for all our residents. Highlights of Our Work and Progress:

Promoting Partnership and Collaboration

- Kept the promise to build a better relationship with our stakeholders by building a solid working relationship with Richmond Heights Schools. I attended my first First Ring School Collaborative meeting with Superintendent Dr. Willis. The FRSC is comprised of 17 school districts surrounding the city of Cleveland, and together, these districts serve over 100,000 students throughout the region. The goal of the Collaborative is to address the common challenges related to poverty, mobility, diversity, and the achievement gap.



- Conducted a Citywide Roundtable with Cuyahoga County and business owners to better understand their businesses and discover resources for tremendous business success.
- Held a Community Resource Fair to connect residents with local, state, and federal resources.
- Hosted the city's First Employee Retreat to brainstorm on completing our city's master plan.
- Renewed our contract with the Community Partnership on Aging to help seniors thrive by providing resources that support and preserve their independence.
- We are bringing City Hall into the 21st Century by upgrading our technology infrastructure to serve our stakeholders better and will soon have a NEW innovated city website! You will soon see new signage at the entrances to the city, and road repairs are underway.
- We are focusing on diversity, equity, and inclusion as city values. We have hired a Finance Director, Recreation Director, and a Human Resource Director to help better serve our community.

Highlights and Progress Continue:

- We are making residents our top priority by implementing a Community First Log sheet to track all calls and concerns, instituting a policy that all resident calls will receive attention within 24 hours, and implementing the Employee of the Month program to highlight our fantastic city staff and to encourage residents to meet them! Our team plays a vital part in building relationships in our city.
- Supporting Safety, Funding, and our Quality of Life by hiring more firefighters and police officers to help ensure that Richmond Heights is safe.
- Designated Greenwood Farm as an official community park. The city can now apply for a broader selection of grants to improve Greenwood Farm as a community space.
- Joined Heritage Home program to provide residents with critical home renovation and repair resources.
- We secured the Councils approval for road repairs and striping. It has been five years since we have striped our entire city, and striping will start before Fall. Please be cautious and watch out for our street team as this work is completed.
- Thanks to UH Richmond Medical Center, our Community Garden is on the way! We are working with Cuyahoga Soil and Water to design the layout for our community gardens: six raised beds (2 feet tall) and six fruit trees. (**Volunteers are needed**).
- Convened a listening session with Faith-based leaders to help unify the community.



There is so much to be proud of in Richmond Heights. We celebrated the Boys Basketball Team's amazing victory, and soon we will have "Home of the State Champions" on our city entrance signs. We are attracting new businesses here. We watched a national film production called **"Shelby Oaks"** occur at Greenwood Farm Community Park. And, after being closed for over two years, we will reopen our spray ground to residents this summer.

Juneteenth Celebration

Summer 2022

This year, we passed legislation honoring Juneteenth as a national holiday. Juneteenth became an official federal holiday in 2021, and it commemorates the release of all African Americans held as slaves in the United States.

Juneteenth was first celebrated on June 19, 1865, when federal troops arrived on the shores of Galveston, Texas. These troops brought news that the Civil War had ended, and President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation freed enslaved people. Though slaves were emancipated at various times, June 19, 1865 is the commemorative date.

Here is a bit of history:

On January 1, 1863, President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, a war strategy; however, that proclamation only included select states in the United States and did not include those southern states that had seceded from the United States, nor did it include the border states between the Union and Confederate states. The scope of states included in the Emancipation was extremely limited.


That being the case, it took the strength of the Thirteenth Amendment to abolish slavery in the United States. And, even that was not immediate. On March 16, 1995, Mississippi was the last state to ratify the Thirteenth Amendment, which had been adopted 130 years before. This is what makes this celebration a jubilee!

The Service Department Awarded Funding For New Trucks

The City of Richmond Heights submitted a project proposal to the Ohio EPA Diesel Mitigation Grant Program (DTNA) to replace two heavy-duty local freight trucks and one local freight truck with three new clean diesel trucks in August 2020. The city's project proposal was accepted and the city was awarded \$211,474.00 in funding. This amount included \$59,862 for 75% of the cost to replace one local freight truck with one new clean diesel-powered freight truck; and \$151,161 for 50% of the cost to replace two heavy-duty trucks with two new clean diesel-powered heavy-duty trucks.

DTNA/Freightliner production schedule has been adjusted several times since the initial order due to a global supply chain issue arising from the pandemic. The city's local freight truck, Freightliner M2 106, arrived at Valley Freightliner on July 23, 2021, and was delivered to Concord Road Equipment Manufacturing to install a dump body and a hoist package. With disrupted global supply chain and employment issues arising from the pandemic, the truck remains at Concord Road Equipment Manufacturing with completion by September. The city's two new heavy-duty trucks were delivered in April 2022 and are currently awaiting build-out.





Economic Development News

In December 2021, City Council approved financial assistance programs supporting the 220 million dollar Belle Oaks Marketplace residential and retail development. These economic development programs, created and authorized by the State of Ohio, include a 15-year Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) tax abatement and 15-year Tax Increment Financing (TIF) and Urban Renewal tax exemptions, all of which will support the bond financing component of the overall Belle Oaks financing package. In addition to the bond financing, the developer, DealPoint Merrill, will contribute \$40 million in equity financing and construction loans of approximately \$122 million. Groundbreaking is anticipated this fall, followed by demolition of the former Richmond Town Square Mall (except for the Life Storage building) and initial site work for construction. In addition to previously approved apartment units and restaurant/retail space, Belle Oaks Marketplace will include a 159,900 square-foot Meijer store at the southern end of the development facing Wilson Mills Road. The design review of the proposed Meijer store by the City's Architectural Review Board will begin this month. Renovations and repairs to walkways in the Community Park and on the east side of Richmond Road along the Cuyahoga County Airport have been completed using funds from a \$150,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) awarded to the City by Cuyahoga County last year.

The final layer of asphalt to the walkways was applied in April. New concrete walkways from the parking lot to the Kiwanis Lodge Community Center were also completed as part of the walkway project. This Summer, you will see the installation of a new playground at DeSan Park using funds from a \$50,000 Community Development Supplemental Grant (CDSG) awarded to the City by Cuyahoga County last year. Richmond Heights applies annually to Cuyahoga County for CDBG and CDSG grants. If awarded, the City can utilize these funds to achieve the city's master plan goals of "improving all facilities at the municipal parks including playgrounds, recreational facilities, trails around the park and the Kiwanis Lodge Community Center." Last month Cuyahoga County Council voted to award Richmond Heights a CDBG grant for \$150,000 to help fund the replacement of the roof on the Kiwanis Lodge Community Center. The total project cost for the roof replacement is estimated to be \$190,000, with the balance of the cost coming from City funds. The County Council also voted to award the city a \$50,000 CDSG grant for lighting and flooring improvements in the Kiwanis Hall (the smaller hall) in the Kiwanis Lodge. Both projects should be completed this year. If you drive by Cuyahoga County Airport on Richmond Road, you can see that the steel structure has been completed for the new Flexjet Global Operations Center. When completed next year, this facility will be the nerve center for tracking and monitoring all Flexjet-operated corporate aircraft worldwide, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The use of cell phones and other handheld devices is prohibited while operating a motor vehicle within the city. The devices may only be operated in "hands-free" mode.




Loud music from cars is inappropriate, and there's a law against disturbing the peace. While we all love driving around listening to music with the windows down, please keep the volume to a reasonable level.

Attention Richmond Heights



On May 30, 2022, in compliance with state law, Richmond Heights City Council passed an ordinance prohibiting Richmond Heights residents from the discharge, ignition, or explosion of fireworks at all times and dates.





Richmond Heights is now a member of Tri-Community CERT.

In January, the City of Richmond Heights regionalized our Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) with the Tri-Community CERT. Our CERT program now encompasses the Cities of Highland Heights, Mayfield Heights, Mayfield Village, and Richmond Heights. Tri-Community CERT has 70 members who have completed the approved CERT training course.

Mayor Thomas recently completed the 20-hour, 9-module course and is an active member of the Tri-Community CERT. What is CERT? The CERT program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area. It trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community.

CERT members can also help with non-emergency projects that help improve safety in the community. What does CERT training entail? The CERT training for community groups is usually delivered in 2 1/2-hour sessions, one evening a week over a 7-9-week period or two evenings per week over a 3-4-week period. All training is free of charge! How can I get involved?

Division Of Fire Hires Four New Firefighters

On February 25, Jason Lynch, Jared Hammond, Matthew Beall, and Richard Kristosik began their firefighting careers with the City of Richmond Heights. All are Fire Academy trained, hold Firefighter II certification, and are certified, Paramedics. The new firefighters were assigned to 24-hour shift rotations following a two-week orientation period.

A SAFER grant award fully funds the cost for three positions for the next three years. The fourth position backfills a retirement, which occurred in October 2021. The addition of the firefighters brings the Division of Fire to full staffing.

The experience and knowledge of these young firefighters will serve the Citizens of Richmond Heights well.

Thank you to Mayor Thomas, Members of Council, our Civil Service Commission, and Human Resources for making this process a success.

Residential Lock Box Program-When Seconds Count



The Residential Lock Box Program is designed to expedite access to seniors/physically challenged adults in their homes during medical or other emergencies. The Lock Box Program also reduces the likelihood of property damage caused by first responders forcing entry into a home in response to an emergency call. In many emergencies, an individual who calls 911 may be unable to open their door when firefighters arrive. This is especially true with senior citizens that suffer a fall, stroke, or heart attack. In these instances, every second counts.

HERITAGE HOME PROGRAM

The City of Richmond Heights is now participating in the Heritage Home Program of the Cleveland Restoration Society (CRS). This program provides owners of homes over 50 years old with access to guidance and low-cost financing for home improvement and maintenance projects. This letter aims to inform you of this wonderful program that is available to you.

First, the Heritage Home Program (HHP) provides FREE Technical Assistance for home repair and maintenance projects. The FREE Technical Assistance includes:

- Site Visits to your home to assess projects and provide feedback.
- Advice on kitchen and bathroom remodels.
- Guidance on repair and maintenance as well as compatible additions.
- Assistance finding contractors and evaluation of contractor estimates.
- Impartial product and service reviews.
- Color consultations for exterior painting.
